AFI 34-1203 Drill & Ceremony Section 5C—Manual of the Guidon (Search 'Drill & Ceremony AFI)Guide - In front of the flight, no guidonGuidon - The pole with the flagGuidon Bearer - In front of the flight, no guidonGuidon Bearer is at the front of the flight, representing structure, discipline, and the flight! The Guidon Bearer is responsible for ensuring the guidon is taken everywhere with the flight. Represents the flight and ensures proper pace for the flight when moving in formation.Holding the Guidon straight up against your side and keeping it glued while walking is key!It is important for the Guidon Bearer to always be in the front when we are going anywhere and the guidon should also be in front of the Flight during formation, essentially near where Element 1 is. (Always position on the right side of the flight) Line FormationThe arrangement of units one behind the other with the guide and element leader to the extreme right flankThe guidon bearer is in front of the farthest right of the formationPosition of the flight commander: six paces away and centered on the flightColumn FormationThe arrangement of units side by side with guide and element leaders to the headThe guidon bearer is abreast and to the right of the first element leader at normal intervalPosition of the flight commander: back thirdInverted Column Formation The arrangement of units side by side with guide and element leaders to the rearPosition of the flight commander: back third of the inverted flight\*\* Knowing where the Guideon bearer is positioned is key to knowing what formation you are in. Column Right: Third element: immediate 90° turnSecond element: pivot 45°, take two steps, pivot 45°First element: pivot 45°, take four steps, pivot 45°go into half steps after completing your turns and catching up to the flightColumn Left: First element: immediate 90° turnSecond element: pivot 45°, take two steps, pivot 45°Third element: pivot 45°, take four steps, pivot 45°go into half steps after completing your turns and catching up to the flightExpectation: Cadets are to demonstrate their ability to be directive and take ownership of a flight in a time and space constrained environment.What to expect:You will be handed a card with 20 drill movements that must be executed within 5 minutes the second you say your first command.The flight will be in 2 elements.The drill pad will be in a squared size. The dimensions vary.You will have 1 minute to review the drill card and position your flight anywhere within the drill pad. Having an idea beforehand helps a lot, but stay confident in your knowledge when things don't go as planned!The current flight commander will call for the cadet who will be the next flight commander to exit the flight and stand in front using the verbiage: "Cadet \_\_\_ front and center."The cadet being called to take control will salute and report in using the verbiage: "Cadet \_\_\_ Cadet \_\_\_ reports as ordered." The flight commander will salute and pass command to the cadet by saying, "Take control of the flight."The original flight commander will take a step back on their right foot, salute, and say one of the following: "Cadet \_\_\_ Cadet \_\_\_ requests permission to return to ranks" (if you have been in the flight)"Cadet \_\_\_ Cadet \_\_\_ requests permission to fall into the flight" (if you have not already fallen into the flight)The new flight commander will salute back and say, "Return to ranks" or "Fall into the flight" depending on the previous statement.The original flight commander will use facing movements to quickly fall into the back of the flight. Column Right - Right footColumn Left - Left footRight Flank - Right footLeft Flank - Left footTo the rear - Right footCounter march - Left footCadence for right/left step starts when feet are apart. Projection is the ability of your voice to reach whatever distance necessary without undue strain. Voice is focused on the person farthest away.Learning how to use your diaphragm instead of just yelling is crucial. Photo: www.facebook.com.The display of the unit's guidon is a time-honored tradition. In the olden days, when troops marched in formation into combat, the guidon was used to alert the commanding general to the disposition of his subordinate units during a battle - which ones were under stress, which were still in reserve, which were moving, and which were stationary. Couriers always knew that a unit's guidon accompanied its commander, and soldiers used them as rally points after engaging in an action. Because of the nature of modern warfare, weaponry, and with ever more sophisticated communication techniques arising, highlighting the commander's position with a colorful flag is no longer safe or necessary. Nevertheless, the guidon is used extensively during garrison operations as a way for commanders to mark and recognize the activities of their units, and as a source of morale for the troops. The guidon bearer is the most visible person in the formation. It is a high-intensity position and requires discipline and knowledge. As a platoon leader or PSG, you must know the guidon bearer's job to make your platoon look good in front of your evaluator. Here are some rules to remember. 1. The Guidon always faces forward. Wherever the formation faces, the guidon goes first and faces out. Whenever Left Face or Right Face is called, the guidon bearer moves at a double-time to the new position at the head of the platoon. 2. When moving, the Guidon always accompanies the PL. You march to the right of the guidon at a one-arm-length interval. 3. The guidon stays outside until the colors are retired. This means all day, it never goes inside. When the platoon goes inside, the guidon is posted at the building's main entrance. 4. The guidon is as a weapon. This means that the rules of drill and ceremony apply to it accordingly. At Parade Rest, the guidon is held extended from the left hand, with the base to the right and parallel to the toe of the right foot. At Attention, it is brought in one count toward the body and held straight up and down without moving the hand position. At the command of Forward March, the guidon is shouldered. At the preparatory command of Forward, it is thrust upward with the right hand, the base steadied with the left at chest level. At the command of execution, MARCH, the right hand is brought down to the side, grasping the base with the palm facing inward and the thumb toward the ground. On the first marching step, the left hand is then brought to the side and swings back and forth naturally as in a normal marching rhythm. While marching, the guidon stays perpendicular with the marching surface and does not sway back and forth. 5. The guidon accompanies the platoon during PT too. This is why the best runner in the unit is generally given the honor of carrying the guidon on a run or a training foot march. If the guidon bearer has to fall out to go puke, or pretend to "tie his shoe," or if he or she just can't make it, it will reflect poorly on the unit's leadership. Nevertheless, if this happens, the guidon still must be handed off to another soldier so that it stays in the front of the formation.
