Obtaining your West Virginian driver's permit involves passing a vision screening and written test, as per the official state manual. This online service helps you prepare for the 25-question multiple-choice exam covering traffic rules, signs, markings, and safe driving practices. To pass, you must score at least 76% in person at the DMV. The Instruction Permit is the first stage of West Virginia's Graduated Driver's License (GDL) program for drivers under 18. As a permit holder between ages 15-17, you'll need to drive with a licensed adult over 21 years old. After meeting certain requirements, such as completing 50 hours of practice and passing skills tests, you can progress to the Intermediate Driver's License. Those over 18 applying for a license must hold an instruction permit for at least 30 days before being eligible for the road test. To apply, provide proof of identity, legal presence, Social Security card, and two proofs of residence. Under-18 applicants require signed consent from a parent or guardian and proof of enrollment in secondary school. The online practice test is free and updated for May 2025, mimicking real exam conditions with immediate feedback on missed questions. This helps ensure you pass the knowledge test the first time. With a learner's permit, you must have a licensed driver at least 21 years old accompanying you. For those under 18, there are specific driving restrictions during the first year of having a permit. Frequently Asked Questions According to the Graduated Driver's License program in West Virginia, you must be at least 15 years old to apply for an instruction permit. To obtain an intermediate license, you must be at least 16 years old and have held the permit for 6 months. At 17 years old, you become eligible for a class E license. You have two options: You can take the test at a West Virginia DMV office by scheduling an appointment online and selecting a date and time. You can opt for the online test using a laptop equipped with a webcam. If you are under 18, you must be supervised by an adult over 18. Upon passing the test, you will receive a completion certificate valid for six months. To obtain your permit, you must bring it to a DMV office with the other required documents. As a first-time applicant in West Virginia, you are required to bring the following documents: Proof of identity (if you have changed your legal name, provide documents to certify it), Proof of Social Security number, Two proofs of West Virginia residency, School Driver Eligibility Certificate (for minors). Additionally, the DMV will provide you with the application, which must be signed by a parent or guardian if you are under 18. The online DMV written test is available in English and Spanish (audio versions are also provided). If needed, you can request assistance from a sign language interpreter or translator. Restrictions for an instruction permit holder:- A licensed driver aged 21 or over must be present in the front seat when driving.- Driving is permitted only between 5:00 am and 10:00 pm.- Only two non-family member passengers are allowed.- Cell phone usage is prohibited. Restrictions for an intermediate license holder:- Driving without a supervising adult is allowed between 5:00 am and 10:00 pm. Between 10:00 pm and 5:00 am, you cannot drive unless accompanied by a supervising adult or for specific reasons like employment, school, religious activities, or emergencies.- During the first six months, no passengers under the age of 20 are allowed, except for siblings. During the second six months, only one non-family member passenger under 20 is permitted.- Cell phone usage is prohibited. After obtaining a license, these restrictions still apply:- All occupants must wear seat belts.- You cannot drive after consuming any amount of alcohol until you are 21 (zero alcohol tolerance). For minor applicants, the permit expires on their 18th birthday, with an additional 30-day grace period beyond this date. For individuals over 18, the instruction permit is valid for a period of 180 days. If it expires, the DMV test must be retaken. In both cases, this permit is not renewable. If you fail your DMV written test in West Virginia, you can retake it after a waiting period of 7 days. A retest fee is required. To obtain a driver's license in West Virginia, you must meet the following requirements: 1. Be at least 16 years of age. 2. Complete a state-approved driver's education course. 3. Hold a learner's permit for a minimum of 6 months (if under 18 years old). 4. Pass a vision test, knowledge test, and a road skills test. 5. Provide proof of identity, residency, and Social Security number. 6. Pay the required fees. In order to get a driver's license in West Virginia, minors need documentation from school and consent from parents or guardians. Fees for licenses vary depending on the type you're applying for. Here are the fees as of 2021:- Class E (operator) license is \$5 - Class F (motorcycle) license is \$15 - Class G (graduated driver's license) costs \$5 - Commercial Driver's License (CDL): knowledge test is \$25, skills test is \$100, and license fee ranges from \$75 to \$150. These fees might change, plus there could be extra charges if you need to retake any tests or get endorsements on your license. West Virginia requires applicants for a Class E license to be at least 16 years old. If they're under 18, they have to finish a state-approved driver's education course and hold a learner's permit for six months before applying. In addition, they need proof of school enrollment or graduation and consent from parents or guardians. When getting a driver's license in West Virginia, you'll need these documents: 1) proof of identity and residency like a certified birth certificate or valid passport; 2) your Social Security card or proof of your SSN; 3) two documents showing your West Virginia address; 4) if under 18, proof of school enrollment or graduation and consent from parents or guardians. All documents must be originals or copies that are officially certified and either in English or have an official translation. Before getting a license, you might also need to pass a vision test and written knowledge test. To get your driver's license, you'll need to pass a driving skills test. To schedule this test: 1) contact a local DMV office for an appointment, 2) provide your name, learner's permit number, and preferred testing date; 3) arrive at the DMV with a licensed driver and a vehicle that meets state requirements; 4) show you can drive safely by performing turns, parking, and other maneuvers. If you pass, you'll get your Class E license. If not, you can retake the test after seven days. New drivers in West Virginia are subject to certain restrictions after obtaining their license, which are designed to promote safe driving habits and provide experience. These regulations apply for the first six months after licensure, during which time new drivers should focus on developing responsible driving practices. New drivers in West Virginia gotta follow some rules. If they got their license recently, they can't drive with more than one passenger under 20 who ain't family, unless a licensed adult over 21 is in the car too. For the next six months after gettin' their license, new drivers can't drive with more than three passengers under 20 who ain't family members either, but if there's an adult over 21 along for the ride, that restriction don't apply. All drivers under 18 gotta put down their phones while drivin', that means no texting, makin' calls, or scrollin' through social media. These rules are in place to help new drivers get some practice and learn safe driving habits. If you wanna get a driver's license in West Virginia, you can't do it all online, but you can fill out the app online and save yourself some time when you go to the DMV. Just remember, you gotta come in person to take tests and give papers, and you'll need an appointment for most DMV stuff. One more thing: if you got a learner's permit in West Virginia, you gotta be with a licensed driver over 21 who's been drivin' for three years, no matter where you are. And finally, your West Virginia driver's license is good for five years, but the expiration date depends on how old you are and what kind of license you got. In West Virginia, drivers under 21 years old can keep their licenses valid until they turn 21, regardless of the original issuance date. For those over 21, the license remains valid for five years from its issue date. However, seniors aged 75 or older have a two-year validity period instead. Renewing is essential to avoid issues; drivers can renew up to six months before expiration and should keep track of their dates to avoid delays. Eligible online renewal requires being a U.S. citizen with valid Social Security, having an unexpired license, and meeting the age limit of 50 or less without vision problems. Those meeting these requirements can renew online through the West Virginia DMV website up to six months before expiration. Non-eligible drivers may need to renew in person if their licenses are expired over six months or do not meet the online renewal criteria. Getting a driver's license in West Virginia involves several steps and requirements. A driver's license allows you to operate a vehicle on public roads without supervision, while a learner's permit is a temporary license that lets you practice driving under the guidance of a licensed driver who's at least 21 years old with three years of experience. To get your learner's permit, you must complete supervised driving hours and pass a road test before applying for a full driver's license. In terms of vision requirements, West Virginia demands a minimum visual acuity of 20/40 in each eye with or without corrective lenses. If you wear glasses or contacts, you'll need to bring them to the DMV vision exam. When using a rental car for the driving test, ensure it has a valid registration, insurance, and inspection sticker. To take the test in West Virginia, you'll require proof of identity, Social Security number, residency, and payment. Additionally, if under 18, a parent or legal guardian must accompany you with identification and proof of residency. The DMV offers written tests in multiple languages, including Spanish, French, German, Russian, and Japanese, but availability may vary by location. If you fail the test, you can retake it after at least one business day, paying the required fee each time. A report outlining incorrect answers will be provided to help identify areas for improvement. After three failures, a driver's education course is necessary before retesting. Note that passing is achievable, yet bear in mind you'll need to cover testing costs each attempt. It's worth noting, if you don't pass after three tries, a driver's ed course will be necessary prior to retaking. Therefore, it's advised to thoroughly prepare and pace yourself while studying to avoid further test attempts.
