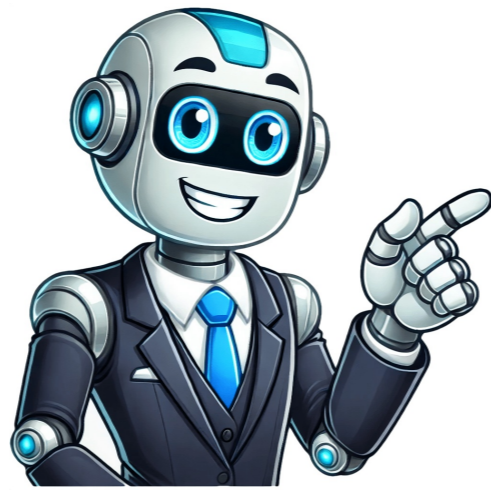

Naval academy commandant

The National Defence Academy's top official is the Commandant, who oversees and manages all activities at the academy. This position rotates among three-star rank officers from the Indian Army, Navy, and Air Force. The Deputy Commandant assists the Commandant and holds a two-star rank, while other key personnel include Brigadier Administration, Principal Director (Training), Civilian Principal, and Adjutant. The National Defence Academy was established in Pune on December 7, 1954, succeeding the Joint Services Wing at the Indian Military Academy. Since its inception, the academy has had several Commandants, including Major General Thakur Mahadeo Singh, who was the first head of JSW at IMA, and Rear Admiral Benjamin Abraham Samson, the first non-army and naval officer to hold this position. The list of Commandants includes officers from all three services: Indian Army, Navy, and Air Force, with some notable individuals serving in this role, such as Air Marshal M J Dotiwala, who was the first three-star air force officer to be the commandant. He completed training at various nuclear power schools and reported to several ships, including USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69). Holley served as a Recruiter and later became a Plank Owner on PCU GEORGE H. W. BUSH. He attended the US Naval Academy as the 8th Company Senior Enlisted Leader. Master Chief Holley was selected to serve as Reactor Department Master Chief onboard USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER from January 2019 to April 2022, leading a department of 450 Sailors through multiple CNO availabilities and deployments to the Fifth Fleet. The United States Naval Academy (USNA) has a unique structure that is distinct from traditional colleges and universities. The Superintendent, currently Vice Admiral Sean Buck, serves as the president of the academy. The Commandant of Midshipmen's Office, Brigadier General Jeannie Leavitt, oversees student affairs, discipline, professional development, and welfare. This office is responsible for training, performance, character development, and overall well-being of midshipmen. The Deputy Commandant, a civilian faculty member, advises on academic matters, while six battalion officers supervise company officers and enlisted personnel in administering the battalions. The Division of Professional Development supports midshipmen's professional growth through programs like Leadership Programs, Character Development & Training, and the Midshipman Development Center. Academically, Dr. Andrew T. Phillips, the Academic Dean and Provost, handles curriculum and academic affairs. Resources include academic advising, student clubs, intramural sports, professional development programs, and health services. The USNA's structure is military-oriented, with a hierarchical atmosphere that supports midshipmen's welfare and development but also maintains a sense of discipline. The commandant of midshipmen is a key figure at the United States Naval Academy, serving as second-in-command and overseeing the development and daily activities of over 4,400 midshipmen. This role is comparable to that of a dean of students in civilian universities, with the commandant reporting directly to the superintendent. Typically holding the rank of captain or higher, some past commandants have been from the United States Marine Corps. Historically, notable individuals who held the position include Lieutenant James Harman Ward and Commander Thomas Tingey Craven, both of whom served multiple terms throughout the 19th century. Lastly, the Brigade of Midshipmen has announced the schedule for formal dress parades on Worden Field for the spring semester, with parades set to take place on Fridays, April 4, April 11, and subsequent dates at 4 p.m.
