Frequently Asked Questions You must be at least 15 ½ years old to apply for a learner’s permit. At 16 years and 3 months of age, you can obtain a driver’s license. However, your license will be restricted until you reach 18 years old. You have to schedule your appointment online. Simply select dates and times according to your preferences and the available options at your chosen Virginia DMV office. Check if your school is enrolled in DMV’s remote testing program to take the DMV written test directly in your school. Make sure you have the following documents:An application for a Virginia Driver’s License signed by your parent/legal guardian unless you are over 18 or emancipated.One proof of identity.One proof of legal presence.Two proofs of Virginia residency.Proof of Social Security number (SSN).You can refer to this guide to check the required documentation. The DMV written test in Virginia is available in various languages, including English, Amharic (Ethiopian), Arabic, Chinese/Mandarin, Chinese/Mandarin (Traditional), Dari, Farsi, French, German, Haitian Creole, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Kurdish, Mongolian, Nepali, Pashto, Punjabi, Russian, Spanish, Thai, Twi (Akan), Turkish, and Urdu. You must answer all the questions correctly on the first part about road signs, and you can miss up to 6 questions on the second part. You can’t proceed to the second part of the exam if you answer any question incorrectly in the first part. With a learner’s permit, you may drive under the following conditions:You can operate only with the supervision of a licensed driver who is at least 21 years old, or with a family member who is 18 or older and holds a driver’s license, seated near you.You cannot transport more than one passenger under 18, except for siblings.After obtaining a driver’s license, certain restrictions apply until you reach 18 years old.Driving between midnight and 4 a.m. is not allowed, except for work or school activities, with a licensed parent or spouse aged 18 or older, or in case of emergencies.For the first year, you may carry only one passenger under 21, unless accompanied by a parent or guardian seated near you. After one year, you can transport a maximum of three passengers under 21 for school activities or emergencies, or if accompanied by a licensed adult aged 21 or older seated near you. You need to obtain a driver’s license within one year after passing the DMV test, or you will have to retake it. If you’re temporarily authorized to be in the U.S., the expiration date of your learner’s permit will match the expiration date shown on the document used to prove your legal presence. If you’re under 18 years old, you’re required to wait 15 days while if you’re 18 or older, you can retake the DMV written test the next day. However, regardless of age, if you fail the exam three times, you must complete an approved Driver Training School program. You’ll also need to pass vision, knowledge and road skills tests. If you’re under 19, you must complete a state-approved driver education program. Payment for the applicable fees is also required. In Virginia, the cost of acquiring a driver’s license depends on the duration of the license. A license valid for 5 years costs \$20, while an 8-year license costs \$32. This equates to \$4 per year. However, there may be additional fees for tests or driver education programs, particularly for new drivers or those under 19 years old. In Virginia, the minimum age for getting a driver’s license is 16 years and 3 months. However, before obtaining a driver’s license, teenagers must first hold a learner’s permit for at least nine months, complete a state-approved driver education program, and maintain a clean driving record. When applying for a driver’s license in Virginia, you need to provide one proof of identity, one proof of legal presence, two proofs of Virginia residency, and one proof of your social security number if you’ve been issued one. The agency also collects Virginia’s fuel tax, monitors the state’s trucking industry and serves as Virginia’s Highway Safety Office. In addition, the agency effectively enforces motoring and transportation-related tax laws, and efficiently collects and distributes transportation-related revenues. The Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (Virginia DMV) serves a customer base of approximately 423,000 ID card holders and 6.2 million licensed drivers with over 7.8 million registered vehicles in Virginia. Virginia DMV has more daily face-to-face contact with Virginia’s citizens than any other state agency. The agency also serves a wide array of businesses including dealers, fuel tax customers, rental companies, driving schools, other state agencies, local governments, and non-profit organizations. Through the headquarters in Richmond, Virginia DMV operates customer service centers, call centers, weigh stations, DMV Selects, and mobile visits known as DMV Connect. Virginia DMV also provides service by Internet, automated telephone, and mail.
