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The Pearson Vue NCLEX Trick is an effective unofficial way to let nursing students know if they have passed the NCLEX or not prior to the official results being released. The PVT is often confused with the Pearson Vue Quick Results. The Quick Results are an unofficial endorsed method to see your score. While the Quick Results are "unofficial" they are paid for and come directly from Pearson. If you are doing the PVT, this is not an endorsed method by Pearson (even though it does work). There can be a lot of anxiety for students surrounding the NCLEX. It is important to remember that as long as you've prepared, then you'll do fine. But, even if you're confident going in, there's always some post-test anxiousness. This trick was invented to help students ease their worries, and prepare for their new nursing careers. Today I'm going to show you how the PVT works, how you can do it yourself, and answer some of the commonly asked questions. The Pearson Vue NCLEX Trick, or PVT for short is a way to see if you have passed the NCLEX exam or not. It allows test takers to unofficially view their results prior to the official results release. While the PVT is not a way of officially seeing your results, many students use it for early viewing. These are the steps to do the trick, but remember that it is not the official results. Take the NCLEX exam. After taking the exam, it typically requires about an hour or so before your results are "in the system". After an hour or up to four hours after the exam should be long enough. Log into your PearsonVue.com account and answer the questions. Follow the directions to "sign up" for the test again. Continue with the test sign up and enter your payment information. You will not be charged (especially if you have passed), however if you want to be on the safe side, you can change the credit card expiration date. Again, submit the information. After you submit this time you will receive your "quick-answer" from the PVT. If this screen is what you see with a notice that says "Our records indicate that you have recently scheduled this exam. Another registration cannot be made at this time." Then that means you passed! If you get a credit card charge screen, then that most likely means you failed. However, we have heard of false negatives. Another view of the "Pass" Screen. The PVT is not 100% accurate. There have been some reports of getting a "bad pop-up" or "false result". However, it is a fairly good indicator to what a student's result actually is. In my experience, the trick worked for everyone from my nursing school who tried it. If you're worried about using the trick, but still want your results? There are quick results available from states who participate. However, you do have to pay for them and it's 48 hours later. In my opinion, it's good to do both. It's fun to celebrate, but just be cautious that it isn't 100% accurate. The only way to get official NCLEX results is through your state. It is up to you whether you want to use the PVT. It is important to remember that it's not an official way of viewing results. However, it can be a fun way to check early to ease your mind. As a recent nursing school graduate it can be nerve racking waiting for your results. The Pearson Vue Trick can help to mitigate that, but it can also help you start preparing in case you might not have passed. Regardless, I used the trick myself, and it was very useful for me! Again, if you're willing to pay the extra fee to see your results early through the state then you can. However, this will still be 48 hours after the test. So, if you want a quicker 1-4 hour result, then the PVT might be a good option for you (plus it's free)! I took my NCLEX-RN yesterday morning 5/30. At first I was relieved when I was stopped at 60 questions, but then once I got to my car I was filled with dread and doubt. I felt like I had guessed on all but 3-4 questions. I wasn't sure if I was in the higher level difficulty or if I just truly knew nothing. I used the Hurst review to study and found that it helped mostly for the prioritization and delegation questions (which there were a LOT of). I had probably 10-15 SATA. No other alternate formats. I graduated at the top of my class with a 3.92 GPA, and to think that I potentially failed the NCLEX was devastating. My friend took the NCLEX the day before me and had received an email saying "you've taken the NCLEX" almost immediately after her exam. I did not, and I was panicking! I walked out of the exam at 9:30 AM, and did not receive this email until around 4:30 PM. When I got home around 1:30, I tried the PVT and got the message saying that I currently have an open registration and I cannot register for another NCLEX — indicating that I tried too early to do this trick. I tried again once I received the email at 4:30... and I got the good pop-up (our records indicate blah blah)! It was a huge anxiety-reliever for me, but I'm just paranoid that it's going to turn out wrong. I've always done well on my practice exams via the Exit HESI, ATI, PassPoint, and Hurst. To think that after all of that I could have failed the NCLEX breaks my heart. I'm just holding onto the fact that this PVT has worked for nearly everyone... The Pearson Vue Trick involves attempting to re-register for the same exam and viewing the pop-up response message from the Pearson Vue site. The pop-up you receive from Pearson Vue, is directionally indicative of whether or not you passed your NCLEX. There are four different pop-ups that could appear on your screen after you have performed the trick. We'll walk through each. Good Pop-up There are two good pop-ups, the actual wording may vary slightly but here are the most common responses: Our records indicate that you have recently scheduled this exam. Another registration cannot be made at this time. The candidate currently has an open registration for this exam. A new registration cannot be made at this time. Bad Pop-up The bad pop-up response is: "Card declined...". There may be a reason for your card declining added to the response. Results on Hold The fourth potential response, "The candidate currently has test results that are on hold. Another registration cannot be made at this time.", doesn't indicate a positive or negative result. If you receive this response you may need to wait longer and try again. No matter which pop-up you receive it is not a science and we'll share our data on accuracy next. How Accurate is the Pearson Vue Trick? Thank you! How to do the PVT Submit your NCLEX and wait for the results to be transmitted to the main Pearson Vue servers. This will most likely be almost immediate, but it may take up to a few hours after you click the submit button at your NCLEX testing location. Wait until you receive this email from Pearson Vue: You've Completed the NCLEX - But You Still Have Questions We suggest you wait at least 2 hours before doing the PVT after submitting your NCLEX at Pearson Vue's testing center. Step 2 Go to to try and re-register for another NCLEX. WARNING! We suggest you use an old credit card, or an empty/low-value gift card to prevent getting charged during this trick. Pearson Vue and the NCSBN state that they do not issue refunds for any reason. Some people have said that a current credit card with the wrong expiration date will work, but others claim it will interfere with the PVT because the payment must be legitimate in order to advance to the final step. You can try it, but it might not work. PVT Results Explanation The most accurate passing result is the inability to pay to re-register for another NCLEX attempt. If Pearson Vue lets you re-register for another NCLEX attempt and actually takes your money, then this is not a passing result. That being said, there are a few pop-ups or messages that have been associated with a passing NCLEX attempt. Passing message Our records indicate that you have recently scheduled this exam. Another registration cannot be made at this time. Alternate passing message Please note that with either of these messages (or even the lack of any message at all), the most important factor is payment. The "good" email: No performance report There really isn't a good email, but rather an email that is sent to everyone who takes the NCLEX and is something along the lines of this: You've Completed the NCLEX - But You Still Have Questions Once again, this email is sent to EVERYONE who takes the NCLEX, pass or fail so it's not exactly good, but it's definitely not bad. The performance report is different and is only sent to those who failed. Not getting a candidate performance report (CPN) is considered a passing indicator. Failing results: There are a few things that indicate a failed NCLEX attempt. 1. Attempted Payment Processing If the website lets you follow through with an additional registration attempt and attempts to process your payment (either accepts it, or rejects it based on incorrect payment info) this is a very bad sign, and it is likely that you have not passed the NCLEX. It's not 100%, but the majority of people don't pass if this happens. Why is this a failing indicator? It is more than likely that Pearson Vue has designed its website to not process payments from people who have passed their NCLEX. Although they state that they do not issue refunds, they still don't want angry people brigading them for refunds. Candidate performance reports are only sent to people who failed the NCLEX, so if you get one emailed to you, then, unfortunately, you have not passed. This is 100% accurate. NCLEX Results are on Hold? The candidate currently has test results that are on hold. A new registration cannot be created at this time. There are many possibilities for why your results may be on hold, and it does not mean that you have passed or failed, but simply that the results are not finalized for whatever reason. Will the PVT work for me if my results are on hold? No! You get this message that your results are on hold, then the PVT will not work for you... yet. In this holding period, you cannot get an accurate PVT result (good or bad) and unfortunately, you just have to wait out the hold. We recommend that you try the PVT again at a later time, and hopefully whatever was causing the hold will be resolved sooner rather than later so that you can try the PVT and actually get a pass or fail result. Not really! The "bad" pop-up is a source of contention amongst the PVT community. Some believe there are bad popups, and others believe the only "bad" outcome is attempted payment processing for another test registration. Is the Pearson Vue trick accurate? Yes, for years now, hundreds of thousands of people have had luck using this method before the official results are processed and posted. The reason for the delay in official results is that they need to be verified by a human and paperwork needs to be processed in conjunction with your state's board of nursing. If there were a way to find out your test results faster than anticipated, would you like to try? Some people use the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick to see how well they did on the NCLEX exam. Maybe you have heard of this method but are asking exactly how to do the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick. In this article, I will share 5 steps to do the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick and give you a little information to decide if you are interested in using it after you take the exam. What Exactly is the Pearson Vue NCLEX Trick? The Pearson Vue NCLEX trick is a method by which test-takers try to determine if they have passed the NCLEX exam. The trick is used to see if a test candidate has passed the exam before official results are available from the state board of nursing. Like all hacks, the Pearson Vue NCLEX results trick may not always be 100% accurate. Some sources suggest good pop-ups, which indicate you passed the NCLEX, are more accurate than bad pop-ups which indicate an unsuccessful NCLEX attempt. Although it can be used to give you an idea of whether you passed the NCLEX exam, keep in mind, the Pearson Vue NCLEX Trick is a hack, and should not be used in place of official results. Sources vary regarding how long you should wait to try the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick after testing. While some people try the trick within an hour or so after completing the NCLEX exam, giving yourself a two-to-four-hour post-test window seems to be the best. It is essential to give the system enough time to process your test. The PVT trick is an unofficial NCLEX results hack. There is no charge for the trick itself. However, it would help if you kept in mind that part of using the trick is to attempt to re-register for the NCLEX exam. If you use a valid credit card, there is always a possibility of your card being charged for the new NCLEX registration. Not everyone who uses the Pearson Vue NCLEX Trick will be charged, and it appears it is more likely to happen to those who failed their previous attempt at the NCLEX exam. (The following are the 5 main steps to do the Pearson Vue NCLEX Trick.) Naturally, the first thing you need to do before using the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick is to take the NCLEX (National Council Licensure Examination). When you have completed the NCLEX and submitted the exam for scoring, the server may receive your information immediately. However, it can take up to a few hours, depending on your testing location. Watch your email to receive notification that you've completed the NCLEX. (Please note: Your Pearson Vue account must state that delivery of your completed test is complete before you can use the PVT.) After you log into your Pearson Vue account, follow the on-screen prompts for answering questions. This step is necessary to get back to the page where you will attempt to re-register for the NCLEX. At this point, you will be asked to enter your credit card information. Some people suggest if you are concerned about your credit card being charged when you may not need to retest, you can try to enter an expiration date that is not valid. Keep in mind, however, this could make using the trick more complicated as your card could be declined for inaccurate information. Once you have entered the required data to register for the NCLEX, you will be prompted to verify the form. When you submit the request to retake the NCLEX, you will typically see what people refer to as either a good pop-up or a bad pop-up. If you get a message indicating you have recently scheduled the exam or that another registration cannot be made at this time, that is referred to as a "good pop-up." When you see a good pop-up, this typically suggests you passed the NCLEX. If the site allows you to re-register, you will receive a pop-up with your registration confirmation. This is what is referred to as a bad pop-up and indicates your previous NCLEX attempt was unsuccessful. The main reason using the Pearson NCLEX trick could be a good idea is that having an idea of whether you were successful on the exam or not can help reduce stress as you await official results from Pearson. Depending on whether you get a good pop-up or bad pop-up, you can use the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick to help you decide whether you need to prepare to retest or enjoy the moment anticipating receiving your license. Either way, using the PVT may take a little guesswork out of knowing what to do as you wait. If you use the PVT, you may find that your likelihood of passing is high and save the money you would otherwise spend on re-registering for the test. When this occurs, it usually indicates the first NCLEX attempt resulted in a passing grade. Therefore, a retest is not required. Unfortunately, the only way to know for sure if you have passed the NCLEX is to wait for your official results. Although it does not always happen, the Pearson Vue trick can give you a good pop-up even if you failed the NCLEX exam. Because the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick is not 100% accurate, it is possible for the trick to indicate you failed the NCLEX and later receive an official passing result. Therefore, if you use the PVT and get a bad pop-up, you need to wait for your final results which will be available within six weeks from the date you took the NCLEX. If you have taken the NCLEX test, but the results are not yet available, you can get a "results on hold" message when you attempt to use the Pearson Vue Trick. Getting this message is not a definite indication of either a passing or failing grade on the NCLEX. It simply means the results are not yet finalized. When this happens, the Pearson Vue NCLEX trick will not work, and you will have to wait until the holding period is lifted before you can try the PVT. It is likely that Pearson Vue designed its website to decline payment processing for people who have already taken and passed the NCLEX. If you are attempting to use the Pearson Vue Trick and get a message that your credit card is declined, it could mean one of two things: 1. Either your credit card is invalid, does not have enough funds, or was entered correctly; or 2. the Pearson website declined to process your attempted payment either because you have taken and passed the NCLEX or because there is a hold on your current results. 8. Does the Pearson Vue Trick Work on Weekends? The Pearson Vue trick is a computer-driven solution that does not require humans to process. All that is needed is a reliable internet connection between the testing center and the Pearson Vue servers. Since the internet and servers can remain active seven days a week and no human interaction is needed to verify results, the PVT can work as well on weekends as it does on regular weekdays.
