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Has your men's March Madness bracket been busted? If so, you're far from alone. The 2025 NCAA Tournament saw an estimated 34 million-plus brackets submitted across major online games, according to the NCAA. That includes the NCAA's Men's Bracket Challenge Game, ESPN, CBS, Yahoo, USA TODAY and X's Bracket Challenge Game. It took just one game -- No. 9 Creighton's victory over No. 8 Louisville on Thursday -- to knock out more than half of those bracket entries, the NCAA said. And by the end of the opening day of Round 1, approximately 36,000 perfect brackets were left as No. 10 Arkansas, No. 11 Drake and No. 12 McNeese pulled off upsets. That did, however, mark the highest number of unblemished brackets through one day since the 2019 Big Dance when there were around 60,000 remaining, per the NCAA. So, after the first round wrapped up Friday, are there any perfect brackets still out there? The UConn mens basketball team is seeking its third straight national championship, while the South Carolina Lady Gamecocks try to claim their fourth title in program history after an undefeated 2024 season. Here are key dates and locations for the 2025 mens and womens NCAA basketball tournament, set to kick off on Selection Sunday, March 16. There are now 181 perfect brackets left entering the second round, according to the NCAA. This is the first time since 2019 that all brackets weren't busted in the opening round, per the NCAA. In last year's tournament, the final perfect bracket was knocked out in the second-to-last game of Round 1. The Friday slate of games began with No. 9 Baylor beating No. 8 Mississippi State, bringing the number of perfect brackets down to roughly 22,000 in the process, the NCAA said. That number fell to around 8,500 when No. 12 Colorado State stunned No. 5 Memphis and it dropped to around 4,500 after No. 7 Saint Mary's rallied past No. 10 Vanderbilt. There were fewer than 2,000 perfect brackets left after No. 6 Ole Miss avoided a collapse against No. 11 UNC, the NCAA said. Then, No. 10 New Mexico's upset of No. 7 Marquette did most of the damage as the number dipped below 600. The combination of No. 8 UConn outlasting No. 9 Oklahoma, No. 6 Illinois cruising past No. 11 Xavier and No. 5 Oregon crushing No. 12 Liberty then left the number of perfect brackets at 181 entering the second round, according to the NCAA. There has never been a verifiable perfect March Madness bracket, according to the NCAA. The odds of filling out a perfect bracket are 1 in 9,223,372,036,854,775,808. The longest a bracket has remained perfect was 49 games in the 2019 tourney, according to the NCAA. Ohio man Gregg Nigl broke the previous record of 39 by picking every game correctly until the second Sweet 16 contest, which was a No. 3 Purdue overtime win against No. 2 Tennessee. There were approximately 5 million women's brackets submitted among major online games (Women's Bracket Challenge Game, ESPN, CBS, Yahoo and USA TODAY), according to the NCAA. And after just two lower seeds won on Friday -- No. 9 Indiana and No. 10 Oregon -- roughly 83,000 perfect brackets remain entering the Day 2 of the first round, per the NCAA. Drake, an 11-seed, beating 6-seeded Missouri also put a dent in many peoples plans for perfection.Colorado State, also a 12 seed, topped No. 5 Memphis on Friday. One of the more fun props this time of year is attempting to pick as many losers as possible. ESPN reported Friday that there were 30 brackets remaining that picked zero games correctly. "Of course after that, it would be impossible to pick up any wins. In that way, it makes an 'imperfect' bracket easier than a perfect one." It wasn't until No. 3 Purdue beat No. 2 Tennessee that Nigl's bid for the first-ever perfect bracket went down.Since then, no bracket has remained perfect after the first round. It was an incredible run, but the last perfect women's bracket has finally fallen. The final bracket, LisaVT22s Picks 1 on ESPN fell when No. 1 UCLA took down No. 3 LSU, 72-65, in the Elite Eight. Indeed, the March Madness bracket challenge is one of the toughest mathematical puzzles in sports.Odds Against Filling Out a Perfect March Madness BracketHow difficult is it to pick March Madness games with a high success rate? Its hard.Its even tougher to be perfect. So tough that in 2014, one of the worlds richest men, Warren Buffett, offered \$1 billion to anyone who successfully filled out a perfect bracket before the NCAA tournament began.What are the odds of someone filling out a perfect bracket, where college basketball and the March Madness tourney is extremely popular, nowhere near enough brackets are filled out each year to come close to all the possibilities. The American Gaming Association estimates that 70 million brackets are filled out in the United States each year ahead of the tournament. That's only 0.000000000001 percent of the brackets that are possible.A sports fan, even with help from all his friends and family, could never fill out the 9.2 quintillion brackets needed to cover every possibility.Even if every man, woman, and child on the Earth filled out brackets, each person would be required to complete 1.2 billion brackets.Want another way to picture the sheer magnitude of 9.2 quintillion? There are 36.1 million seconds in a year. That means it would take292 billion years to get to 9.2 quintillion seconds. What will college basketball look like in 292 billion years? Somehow were glad we wont be around to find out.Yet another unfathomable way to view the problem of being correct in so many games is by the exponential number. For any two-game section of a first round bracket, the odds of getting perfect is 1 in 8. Fair enough. For an entire region (16 teams, 31 games in the region), its 1 in 32,768. Doesn't sound bad, right? That's far, far better odds than winning the lottery. But when you keep expanding the game size, you get exponential growth thats hard for even our top-level primare brains to understand. Getting half the bracket correct (two regions, 32 teams, and 62 games) is 1 in 2,147,483,648. Thats 1 in about 2.1 billion. But when we extrapolate that to four regions, the entire 64-team bracket, and 63 games, we arrive at the 9.2 quintillion mentioned above.Best March Madness Bracket Streak in Recent History!n 2019, a college hoops fan in Ohio successfully picked the first 49 games of the NCAA tournament. That means he was correct in all 32 first-round games, all 16 second-round games, and in the first game of theSweet Sixteen.How amazing was that feat? The man was the first person verified to have gotten his bracket to the Sweet 16 round without missing a pick.Bravo, Buckeye.The Adjusted Odds for Picking a Perfect BracketIn actuality, the odds for picking a perfect bracket are a little less than 9.2 quintillion. What? Does that mean this article is pointless? No. The mathematics, without outside factors, are accurate when it says 1 in 9.2 quintillion (add 17 zeros after the 2).Buteach game is not like a coin flip.The March Madness tournament has favorites andunderdogs. There are mismatches, especially in the first round. Only twice since the tournament went to 64 teams has a No. 16 seed defeated a No. 1 seed, for example. And the No. 2 seed has a win percentage of more than 90% against No. 15 seeds.In 2016, a mathematician quoted on the website Five-Thirty-Eight used the probability odds of higher seeds typically winning matchups against lower seeds. How the final women's bracket bust An impressive run at perfection into the Sweet 16 came to a close, as the last perfect bracket picked its first game wrong when No. 3 NC State beat No. 2 Stanford, 77-67, on Friday night. This year's tracking on the women's side involved more than four million brackets. The bracket entry "Courtneys COURT 2" in ESPN's online game got the first 50 games correct, a run better than last year, when No. 8 Ole Miss' upset of No. 1 Stanford in the second round ended the run at perfection. The 50 correct picks in the women's tournament this year bettered the run on the men's side, as No. 8 Utah State's 88-72 win against No. 9 TCU busted all men's brackets on the 31st game close to the end of the first round.
